HCSC Partners With CDC on Antibiotic Stewardship Toolkit

Each year, at least 2.8 million people in the U.S. are infected with antibiotic-resistant bacteria or fungi, and more than 35,000 die as a result, according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

To **combat antibiotic resistance**, HCSC's Quality Innovation Institute is working with the CDC to develop a **health plan toolkit to support antimicrobial stewardship initiatives.** The toolkit will focus on improving outpatient antibiotic prescribing, and include:

- **Education** on why outpatient antibiotic use is a target for quality improvement;
- CDC's Core Elements of Outpatient Antibiotic Stewardship;
- Metrics to measure and track outpatient antibiotic use;
- **Interventions** to consider, with examples and studies of payors and health care systems that have implemented them; and
- A comprehensive collection of resources and references.

Antimicrobial stewardship is nothing new for HCSC. In 2017, the Quality team began a stewardship program to:

- Monitor and inform practitioners of their prescribing behavior;
- Implement a patient safety initiative by reducing unnecessary antimicrobial prescriptions; and
- **Improve HEDIS/QRS rates** for avoidance of antibiotic treatment for acute bronchitis/bronchiolitis and appropriate upper respiratory infection treatment measures.

Implementing an **antimicrobial stewardship program** in hospitals and health care facilities has also **shown** an **annual cost savings of \$200,000 to \$400,000**.
